## **Letter to the Community**

We were recently organizing some files and found a 2005 community survey that asked people what services they would most like to see available at Kalkaska Memorial Health Center. The most requested services included Assisted Living, outpatient surgery, more specialty physicians, and MRI services.

We are proud to report that during the past 10 years, all of those desired services have become a reality.

As a governmental hospital authority owned by the townships of Kalkaska County and Village of Kalkaska, KMHC is supported by your tax dollars. We use that support to provide the services our community needs.

Last year we opened two state-of-the-art Green House homes, the only ones in northern Michigan, that provide a truly home-like environment for loved ones who require 24-hour care.

We also partnered with Kalkaska Public Schools and athletics to launch a cutting-edge, evidenced-based concussion program. Since its inception in 2016, we already have helped provide concussion management to more than 20 student athletes. It is our privilege to help protect these young men and women from the lasting impacts of head injuries.

Our staff has been active in the community sharing their knowledge and skill by offering community education forums on topics such as back safety, kidney health, and heart health.

In last year's report, we mentioned we are all living longer and as a result, chronic disease management is increasingly imperative. With a high prevalence of diabetes in our community, we are excited about starting a comprehensive diabetes program that includes community, group, and one-on-one education. As we look at future plans during the next several years, we anticipate adding more areas to our chronic disease program, such as congestive heart failure, obesity, behavioral health, or asthma.

During the next 10 years, we also expect to provide even more services to meet our community's needs, including chemotherapy, and additional specialty and primary care physicians. New construction or renovations will provide even more efficient patient flow, space for growing services, and additional parking.

KMHC continues to give back to the community in many ways, which you can read about in this report. Please take a look.

We are proud to be part of the Kalkaska community, and I sincerely thank you for using the growing health care services in Kalkaska.

Invests in Workforce Development

Kalkaska Memorial Health Center has a long history of commitment to educating and training local staff. Twenty percent of employees have used one or more aspects of the ongoing retention program.

As part of the effort to provide a skilled workforce, KMHC has awarded scholarships to local high school seniors since 1990, and now gives up to 10 scholarships annually to students.

The hospital's education and retention program has exceeded expectations. "Improving the program over many years has been a benefit to our hospital and the community," said Kalkaska Memorial Administrative Director of Operations Kim Babcock. "It is now ingrained in our culture."

## **Emergency and Urgent Care Visits: 13,254 Visits**

The Emergency Department at Kalkaska Memorial Health Center is always open. Serious and life-threatening illnesses and injuries are triaged and treated by emergency staff.

Kalkaska EMS serves an area of more than 570 square miles of Kalkaska County and receives more than 2,000 calls for service annually.

In 2016, KMHC responded to community need and added two, full-time emergency medicine physicians to staff.

Urgent Care services are available within the Emergency Department from 7 am - 11 pm for minor injuries and ailments.

## Kalkaska Dialysis Center: 6,402 Treatments

The Kalkaska Dialysis Center was recognized in 2016 by the End Stage Renal Disease Network 11 for achieving 5-Diamond status. The recognition reflects implementation of best-practice standards for patient safety and care.

Kalkaska Dialysis Center also achieved a five-star Medicare rating in 2016 for its high quality patient care. The number of patients has more than doubled since opening, Kalkaska Dialysis Center also offers services to vacationers so they can continue treatments and still enjoy their time in northern Michigan.


