



Booster Shot Eligibility and Authorizations

Only certain populations initially vaccinated with the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine can get a booster shot at this time.

- You must have received your second dose more than six months ago.
- The Pfizer booster is not available for those who received the Moderna or Johnson & Johnson/Janssen vaccines.
- The FDA is scheduled to meet Oct. 14-15 to decide whether boosters for Moderna and J&J should be recommended.
- The FDA is scheduled to meet Oct. 26 to discuss an amendment to Pfizer emergency use authorization to allow the use of its COVID-19 vaccine in children 5 through 11 years of age.

Should Get a Booster

- People aged 65 years and older and adults 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions.
- Residents aged 18 years and older of long-term care settings.

May Get a Booster

People aged 18–49 years with underlying medical conditions.

May Get a Booster

Employees and residents at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission.

Examples of workers who may get Pfizer-BioNTech booster shots:

- First responders (e.g., healthcare workers, firefighters, police, congregate care staff)
- Education staff (e.g., teachers, support staff, daycare workers)
- Food and agriculture workers
- Manufacturing workers
- Corrections workers
- U.S. Postal Service workers
- Public transit workers
- Grocery store workers

COVID-19 and the Flu

Both the seasonal flu and COVID-19 share many similar symptoms. So what can you do?

First, protect yourself and others. Take the single most important action against both illnesses by getting both your COVID-19 vaccine AND your flu shot, which can be done in one doctor's visit.

In addition, both illnesses can be prevented with the following measures:

- Mask up in public
- Wash your hands often
- Practice physical distancing of 6-feet or more in public
- Stay home if you feel ill
- Avoid people who are sick

Masking Recommendations



- Masking protects both you and those around you.
- Since COVID-19 has a high viral load it is very transmissible.
- The American Academy of Pediatrics, CDC and MDHHS all strongly recommend masking in school settings.
- Please consider masking both you and your children in school settings, other indoor settings, and in crowded areas.
- Masking will also help prevent the spread of flu and RSV, both which we are already seeing in Michigan.



- Clinic schedule will vary based on resources and demand, currently partnering with HONU to help accommodate booster demand.

- Appointments are required, no walk-ins at this time.

GTCHD continues free COVID-19 diagnostic testing:

This week: Tuesday and Thursday from 9 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. and 1 - 4:00 p.m.

- Testing is drive-up and is done in the parking lot behind the main building, under the carports
- Location: 2600 LaFranier Rd. Traverse City, MI, 49686
- Hours vary week to week depending on staffing check social media and <u>www.gtcountymi.gov/2211</u> for current schedule and link to appointments
- Results are delivered electronically (email/text) within two hours
- PCR Tests are taking up to 72 hours to return results
- This is diagnostic testing for those with symptoms or exposed, not travel testing

- Case numbers high
 - Average daily number of cases reported per day is approaching highest level seen:
 - 72.1 cases/day for HDNW
 - 13.1 cases/day for BLDHD
- Demand for testing and positive test results high
 - Weekly drive-through rapid testing
 - Monday, Oct 4 at E-Free Church, Gaylord: 146 tests with 38 positives
 - Saturday, Oct 9 in Charlevoix County: 114 tests with 36 positives
 - Monday, Oct 4 and Thursday, Oct 7 in Suttons Bay: 163 tests with 17 positives
 - Tuesday, Oct 5 and Friday, Oct 8 in Benzonia: 165 tests with 9 positives
- What we want our jurisdiction to know
 - Stay home if you are ill; keep your child home from school if ill; mask indoors in public places
 - Get tested and get vaccinated for COVID-19 and Influenza
 - There are multiple sites throughout the community offering testing and vaccination




- Cases slightly increasing (1.8%): September 25-October 1= 909 cases; October 2
 October 8 = 925 cases
- Daily cases per million increasing: October 1= 389.2; October 7= 405.7
- Percent positivity increasing: October 1= 16.5%; October 7= 17.3%



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District Health Department #10 COVID-19 Vaccination Trends

- 59.3% of DHD#10 residents have initiated vaccination
- 55.4% of DHD#10 residents have completed vaccination series
- Map shows vaccination rates among 16+ age group by zip code
 - Darker pink = lower vaccination rate


