Hospital Recognized for its Care of Stroke Patients

Munson Medical Center recently was recognized for outstanding achievements in emergency stroke care in 2009 as a member of the INSTINCT stroke study.

The hospital was one of 24 randomly selected Michigan hospitals participating in the INSTINCT (Increasing Stroke Treatment through Interventional Change Tactics) study. The fouryear study, supported by the National Institutes of Health, was a clinical trial testing methods to improve stroke treatment. The study ended on Jan.1, 2010. It was led by Phillip Scott, MD, associate professor of emergency medicine at the University of Michigan.

A key part of the stroke treatment method involves the use of intravenous tPA, a clot-busting medication. It was approved by the FDA in 1996 to reverse the effects of acute ischemic stroke.

Munson had the highest number of patients receiving tPA in 2009 with 23. The hospital also was recognized for best data performance and received an honorable mention for "fastest stroke tPA treatment time."

Medical Education Expands at Munson

Graduate Medical Education continues to expand at Munson Medical Center with the addition of eight students to the Michigan State University College of Human Medicine Traverse City Campus.

Led by Community Assistant Dean Daniel Webster, MD, the program just entered its second year with northern Michigan physicians serving as clerkship directors for the students. Additionally the hospital's continues to train MSU College of Osteopathic Medicine students and Family Practice residents for rural practices.

this year - its largest class.

"We also had a successful recruiting year, matching five residents into the program. We are now starting to prepare for the upcoming recruiting season," he said. "Our clinic continues to work hard, utilizing our electronic medical record for patient care and in programs to help with better reimbursement."

Dr. Rawlin said his first year as program director has been enjoyable, yet challenging. He has recruited two new faculty members. His biggest challenge has definitely been trying to balance administrative duties with patient care. "Overall, I am very happy to be in this position as it really allows me to combine patient care and education."

Dr. Rawlin said national changes to laws surrounding resident work hours will cause some changes in curriculum, and resident call.

Another future change may involve opportunities overseas.

"We have a strong interest among our faculty in international medicine, and we would like to start pursuing the possibility of setting up some type of international medicine experience," he said. "We will continue to train physicians for the full scope of practice, including inpatient, ambulatory, and obstetrics.


A New Physician Reception is planned for Sept. 23 from 6 - 8:30 pm at Hagerty Center. All Munson physicians are encouraged to save the date.

Face – Have the person smile. If half of their smile is crooked, seek emergency treatment immediately.

Arms – Have the person hold out their arms. If one drops or if the person cannot raise one arm, seek emergency treatment immediately.

Speech – Have the person repeat a phrase to you. If their speech is slurred or garbled, seek treatment immediately.

Time – Remember a stroke victim has three hours from the onset of the stroke for tPA to be effective.

study has helped advance the treatment of stroke patients."

Patients who qualify for a tPA treatment must receive the medication within three hours of the stroke.

Determining when the stroke occurred and if the treatment window is open sometimes poses challenges, Glaza said.
